

**Wilfredo A. Geigel** is a trial lawyer by profession, an independent scholar, member and past president of the Society of Virgin Islands Historians and an Adjunct Professor of History at the University of the Virgin Islands, St. Croix Campus. He is the author of three books on legal and historic topics.

**Annette B. Ramirez de Arenano** is a graduate of Mount Holyoke College (political science), Yale (city planning), and the University of Puerto Rico (health planning). She has a doctorate in public health from the Mailman School of Public Health at Columbia University, having graduated with distinction with a concentration in health policy. She has worked in government and academia as well as in the non-profit sector and with community-based organizations. She is a co-author of *A Sojourn in Tropical Medicine* (University of Puerto Rico Press), *Colonialism, Catholicism and Contraception: A History of Birth Control in Puerto Rico* (University of North Carolina Press) and *Regionalization of Health Care: The Puerto Rican Experience* (Oxford University Press). She has published widely in the areas of health policy and the history and practice of public health.

**Raul Mayo-Santana** has a Master in Science and a PhD in developmental psychology and statistics from State University of New York at Albany, postgraduate training on neuropsychology, a Master in Arts in philosophy from the University of Puerto Rico, and had an extensive academic career as a professor, for more than three decades, at the University of Puerto Rico (UPR) School of Public Health and School of Medicine. He is a founding member and past director of the Institute of the History of the Health Sciences at the UPR Medical Sciences Campus and a founding member of the Humanistic Academy of Medicine at the UPR School of Medicine. He is one of the editors of *A Sojourn in Tropical Medicine: Francis W. O'Connor* Diary of a Portorican Trip, 1927 (2008, UPR Press) and has published, as a co-author, four books and several articles on the 19th century history of slavery in Puerto Rico (Center for Social Research, UPR, Rio Piedras Campus, 1992-2007), as well as articles and books in other areas of interest, including one biographical book.

**Niklas Thode Jensen** is a historian and lecturer at the Department of History under the Saxo Institute, University of Copenhagen, Denmark. He has held postdoctoral fellowships at the European University in Florence, Italy, and at the University of Copenhagen, and worked as a visiting researcher at the University of Oxford. He has published on medicine and science on the Danish-(Norwegian) tropical colonies in the Caribbean and India during the eighteenth and nineteenth century.
